

2018 marks our ninth successful year of working with our Zambian partner, Kabushi Entrepreneurship and Vocational Training Centre (KEVTC), delivering vocational training to young people in Ndola.

Located within the Copperbelt province of Zambia, this area was once a thriving mining and manufacturing centre. However, the last decade has seen the collapse of these industries, resulting in thousands of job losses. Almost 60% of young people aged between 15 and 24 in the Copperbelt province aren't in formal employment and there are few opportunities for those with no qualifications to improve their skills. With your generosity and support, KEVTC was able to deliver a 12 month vocational, business and life skills training programme to 354 young people; who successfully graduated from their training and have now formed 57 small business groups. Their commitment to their training means they are now able to earn a sustainable income to support themselves and their families.

Mellbin Simangolwa, Director of KEVTC, shares with us the positive impact that the partnership has had on the community of Kabushi;

With Tools for Self Reliance's consistent funding, equipment support, new supplies and dedicated vocational training programmes, our students are fully empowered with life-long skills to help them contribute to the development of Zambia. And, as they learn and earn, the Kabushi community is also benefitting.

As a training provider, we have seen many positive impacts as a result of the partnership with Tools for Self Reliance. Hundreds of young people have

been empowered with vocational skills and trades for employment, entrepreneurship and self-employment. With dedication from the trainees and the training centre, we have recorded a graduation rate of 98%, this hasn't been achieved by any other vocational training provider in the district. Through developing our partnership, KEVTC's reputation has positively grown and seen a demand increase from the local



community of young people wanting to join a training course. We are proud to have been chosen to provide a motivational talk at the District Youth Forum and for the Civic authority acknowledging the positive impact KEVTC is having on youths and unemployment.

As we celebrate, we invite the rest of the world to join us in thanking Tools for Self Reliance for the warm relationship we have enjoyed over the years. As a result of this partnership, KEVTC has received recognition for its training programmes from the community, government and the corporate sector but most importantly skills have been developed in hundreds of youths whose economic status has greatly improved.

CHALLENGING GENDER STEREOTYPING AT WORK IN GHANA

In Northern Ghana, our Youth Livelihood Empowerment Project (YOLEP) has just passed its half way point with local partner NORSAAC. Thirty young men and women are working hard in their vocational training in carpentry, masonry, tailoring and welding skills, as well as acquiring essential business and life skills.

As part of the project's objectives to empower young people in Northern Ghana with skills training and tools, the project is working to challenge gender stereotypes



at work. Sumaila, Project Officer, pictured on the left and Ukasha, NORSAAC's zonal manager on the right, recently took to their local radio station to host an interactive live discussion, aimed at raising awareness of the adverse effect gender stereotyping has on development.

They took eight calls from the local community during the programme including people expressing interest in the project, and sharing their concerns with these issues as well. One caller shared his personal experience and expressed that 'the discussion has motivated him more as he is in a perceived female job.'

Investing in women is crucial to tackling poverty. If all girls and women had an education and access to new technologies, if they could move into employment and leadership roles, and marry and have children later, the benefits would be felt not just by individuals but by the whole of society. Generational cycles of poverty would be broken - children of women who are educated, and marry and give birth later, are better educated and healthier themselves. Economic growth would accelerate if women participated equally in labour markets to men. Community outreach activities like this radio discussion to start people talking openly about gender stereotyping are an essential step to supporting a positive change. We wish the thirty young men and women well as they continue the next six months of their training.

BRIDGEND GROUP CELEBRATE TEN YEARS TOGETHER

This year, Bridgend Group celebrates over a decade of refurbishing and fundraising for Tools for Self Reliance. Based in Porthcawl, the now 22 person strong group was set up in 2008 after founders John and Gaynor Hanson retired and resettled back in the UK.

Meeting twice a week on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons, their workshop was set up in their back yard, after John saw an opportunity to re-home the old school room of the Tabernacl Chapel which would otherwise have been scrapped. Many new friendships have been formed over ten years, and in the process thousands of tools have been collected, refurbished and packed into over 120 toolkits. We wish the Bridgend Group all the best with their celebrations and open day in October, and we look forward to working together for many more years to come!
