ENDING CHILD MARRIAGE IN NORTHERN GHANA

This year we are joining with Ghanaian partner, NORSAAC to empower young women in some of Northern Ghana's poorest communities.

Women in Northern Ghana are the most marginalised group in the country and face barriers in accessing education, healthcare, and good nutrition. Over a third of girls are married before the age of 18 – for many of the poorest families, marrying girls young is a survival strategy for the household.

This education and advocacy project will enable young women to acquire the skills and knowledge to earn a sustainable income - money that will empower them to have more control over their lives and greater independence. 25 women and 15 young men will train together, learning tailoring, welding, electrical wiring and bee hive making skills through a mix of theory and practical, including an apprenticeship, and the opportunity to gain a recognised trade qualification. Trainees will also take part in literacy and numeracy sessions, business skills training, and life skills and health awareness.

Upon graduation, all participants will supported in establishing their own enterprises, receive a kit of high quality refurbished tools, and have the opportunity to access a small loan. Achieving change means working with the whole community, men and women, boys and girls. As part of the project, we will be reaching over 1000 young people across 20 communities in the Mion and Tolon Districts through a school outreach programme. Planned activities such as workshops and role play will challenge perceptions of women's roles and explore the issue of child marriage.

This has all been made possible with a grant from Kennington Overseas Aid Committee - 2018 was their final year of fundraising after 50 years of supporting overseas projects, so we were especially grateful for their support. We look forward to updating you with news from this project later in the year.

THE VALUE OF PARTNER NETWORKING WORKSHOPS

At the end of last year Clare Nolan, Head of Africa Programme and Jo Shannon, Programmes Facilitator, flew to Sierra Leone on a busy two week evaluation visit to interview 88 trainee graduates, meet with in-country partners and connect with Rotary Club of Bo.

As well as visiting trainees at their new businesses or work placements, partner workshop meetings have recently been established as an important day allocated to evaluation visits.

Travelling from all over the country ,14 representatives from all five of Sierra Leone project partners; Mobility Sierra Leone (MSL), Baptist Women's Union (BWU), Craftshare (CVTC), Educational Centre For The Blind And Visually Impaired (ECBVI), and Future Focus Foundation (FFF), came from Kenena, Freetown and Grafton, to meet for the day. The partner network meeting was established for us to share information as a group, including ideas, discuss challenges and build relationships between the partners to better support each other.

The benefits of connecting our partners through these network meetings has already been seen with partners supporting each other with the arrivals and clearance of tool shipments, sharing safeguarding code on conduct, and partners Mobility Sierra Leone and Future Focus Foundation visiting each other's training centre to share ideas.

From their vast experience in the field, Tools for Self Reliance learn so much from our partners on ways we can develop our projects to increase effectiveness of empowering young people with opportunities that are right for them and their community. They steer the projects, they own it and they deliver it.

All 14 representatives present at the Sierra Leone meeting have over a hundred year's combined experience of working in international development across a diversity of issues including child safeguarding, women's rights and challenging stigmatisation of people with disabilities.



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ROTARY CLUB AND INNER WHEEL UPDATE

We finished 2018 feeling so thankful for the generous support that Rotary and Inner Wheel clubs have given to Tools for Self Reliance throughout the past year.

In March, the Annual Inner Wheel conference in Bournemouth gave us a great opportunity to meet new members and clubs, especially Scottish groups who supported our tailoring projects this year.

Attending both the Rotary in Great Britain and Ireland (RIBI) conference in Torquay, and District 1110 conference in Jersey, were real highlights for us this year, especially with the honour Jo had of speaking at the conference as part of the first day's plenary sessions.

2018 also was saw two districts grants being successfully submitted to support our vocational training projects in Malawi and Sierra Leone. Whilst on the evaluation visit to Sierra Leone Jo and Clare enjoyed the opportunity to meet with and establish links with Rotary Club of Bo. We hope to develop our relationship with them, over the coming year, linking their support to our project delivering partner; Mobility Sierra Leone.



There was also time to celebrate, and in the beautiful summer sunshine we were joined by 70 Rotarians and Inner Wheel members, who represented 14 clubs. At the end of the year we attended as one of the beneficiaries of the wonderful 'The Glory of Christmas' concert hosted by Salvation Army and Rotary club of Southampton West.

We continue to be inspired by the new clubs we connect with, and humbled by the continued generosity of our long-term friendships.

DONCASTER TURNS 30!



On 2 November 1988 a small group of people from Sprotbrough Methodist Church in Doncaster refurbished a carpentry tool kit which was sent to Tanzania in a Tools for Self Reliance shipment, and the Doncaster tool refurbishing group was formed. They didn't realise at the time that this kind gesture would lead to a thirty year legacy.

Now, three decades later, the group has refurbished over 700 sewing machines and is approaching the completion of its 400th kit. Their time and efforts have supported more people to earn sustainable incomes and transform their lives for themselves and their families.


